PROGRESSION PLAYGROUND: BMX FREESTYLE IN LOGAN

The sport, culture, and industry of BMX freestyle has evolved through the DIY (Do-It-Yourself) ethos that embodies urban street culture and the ingenuity of creating something from nothing. Freestyle riders push the boundaries of what is possible on a bike without the conformity and rules of traditional sports.

The true definition freestyle is being in the moment. To be free and to do what you want to do without judgement or criticism. It is this freedom that has enabled freestyle to be not only a sport, but a way of living. Freestyle allows for constant evolution both individually and collectively.

Progression Playground highlights the evolution of Logan's BMX freestyle scene from the early years to today's new generation of riders. This exhibition shines a spotlight on the essence of the sport, tied together by community and self-expression. This Rider Owned – Rider Run ethos has allowed freestyle in Logan to be one of the world's most progressive playgrounds.



DID YOU KNOW:

Tim Wood was Queensland's first rider to successfully land backflips.

In 1993, Tim constructed a customised ramp to launch himself into Logan's Karawatha Quarry. The water provided Tim with a soft landing to perfect the trick. That same year Tim performed the backflip in competition at Beenleigh BMX Complex.

Today, the backflip is recognised as foundation trick used in most disciplines of freestyle riding.

COMMUNITY

Mark Schneider, moved from Townsville to the City of Logan in 1996 to be closer to the ramps at Beenleigh BMX Park. Two years later he organised the Heavy Metal Heroes competition series, and in 2003 co-founded and the Beenleigh BMX Stunts Association (BBSAI). The BBSAI prevented Beenleigh BMX Park from demolition, and provided substantial funding to build new ramps.

Over the past 25 years, most of the Australian riders who established international professional freestyle careers either grew up or rode in the City of Logan. Today BMX Freestyle is an elite sport. BMX and skateboarding are now represented in the Olympic Games. Logan Martin, who grew up in the City of Logan, won the inaugural Olympic gold medal for the Cycling BMX Freestyle Men's Park event at the Tokyo 2020 Olympics.

As a community and a culture, freestyle continues to embrace the core values of the Rider Owned - Rider Run philosophy. We are riders of all ages, genders, sexualities, ethnicities, riding disciplines, and generations. Our home is your local BMX and skate park. CURATOR BIO

Ross D Lavender is a BMX freestyle historian and rider with more than 35 years of experience in the Australian BMX. Throughout the 1990s and 2000s, Ross actively competed in local, state, and national freestyle competitions, as an Australian professional rider.

Not only a rider, Ross has also made significant contributions to the BMX community through his work in media and publishing. He has written for various BMX publications, holding positions as columnist for 2020 BMX Magazine and senior writer for REBELYELL BMX magazine.

In 2012, Ross founded Unscene History and the Australian BMX Freestyle Archive, dedicated to documenting and preserving the sporting and cultural history of freestyle in Australia. His dedication to the sport was further demonstrated through the curation of the BMX exhibit Unscene: The History of Brisbane Freestyle at Jugglers Art Space in 2013.

Ross plays a vital role in bridging the gap between the freestyle community, local council, and heritage groups in the City of Logan, advocating to recognise and promote BMX Freestyle as both a sporting and cultural heritage.

His commitment to preserving the history of BMX freestyle culminated in the publication of his first book in 2023, Transition: 40 Years of Beenleigh BMX Park, supported by Logan City Council's Regional Arts Development Fund.

Ross continues to ride today and can be seen regularly down at Beenleigh BMX Park.

Living Museum of Logan is located inside the Kingston Butter Factory building at 270 Jacaranda Avenue, Kingston, Queensland.

OPENING HOURS

GETTING THERE

By car: Living Museum of Logan is a 35-minute drive from Brisbane off the Pacific Motorway Exit 22, and 45 minutes from the Gold Coast off Pacific Motorway Exit 31.

Parking: Living Museum of Logan is within the Kingston Butter Factory Cultural Precinct which has free onsite car, bus and bike parking available for your convenience.

Public transport: Living Museum of Logan is a short walk from the Kingston train station and bus interchange
