Step 4

### COMPLETE THE LOGAN ARTS BOOKING FORM

Please complete and submit the form via QR code or call 3412 5626 to make your booking. Bookings are made in strict order of receipt from the online school booking form.



Step 2

### **CONFIRMATION AND INVOICING**

We will reserve your theatre performance and invoice the school. You can request changes to student numbers up to 4 weeks prior to the theatre performance (subject to availability). Student theatre tickets are discounted at \$17 per student (unless otherwise specified). Teachers/carers receive complimentary t/heatre seating on a 10:1 ratio. Gallery and museum guided tours are free.

### **BUS BOOKINGS**

The Logan Arts team will liaise directly with the bus providers. A confirmation number will be sent to the school if any issues arise on the day of travel.

Step 4

#### **PAYMENT**

Full payment is due a minimum of 4 weeks prior to the theatre performance date. At this stage student numbers are final. Theatre bookings cannot be held if your final payment is not received by the due date and the reservation will be released. An increase of numbers is possible after the final payment day and is subject to theatre seating availability.

### FINAL CONFIRMATION SENT TO SCHOOLS

A confirmation letter will include your theatre seating allocation and gallery or museum guided tour booking information.

### **ATTEND AND ENJOY!**

Schools will be asked to enter the theatre as a group. We advise arriving at the theatre venue approximately 30 mins prior to your performance. Your friendly gallery or museum tour guide will greet teachers and students at the start of your booked tour.

### Thursday 28 May 2026

WRITE NOW! is an exciting opportunity for Queensland students in Years 5, 6, and 7 to become playwrights, crafting their own scripts and then seeing them performed live by Conservatorium actors. Through hands-on workshops and a thrilling final performance, students will discover the power of storytelling, creativity, and the magic of theatre.

Bring your students' words and imaginations to life on stage!

### WRITE NOW! is about ....

- > Empowering young people to use their voices creatively and recognise their artistic potential.
- > Fostering a love of the arts and storytelling.
- Enhancing literacy, imagination, and innovation through playwriting.
- > Aligning with curriculum in an engaging and dynamic way.
- > Giving students the unforgettable experience of seeing their stories come to life on stage!

### **How it Works:**

**Workshops:** Students will participate in 3-4 playwriting workshops led by Acting Conservatorium staff and student facilitators.

**Scriptwriting:** Students will create, draft, and refine their own short scripts and submit them by the deadline.

**Rehearsal:** Conservatorium actors will rehearse student scripts ready for presentation.

**Performance Day:** The journey culminates in a presentation day at Kingston Butter Factory, where students will get to sit in the audience and see their scripts brought to life by actors in front of their peers and teachers.

**Feedback and growth:** Teachers and students will have the opportunity to reflect on their experience, ensuring the ongoing success and improvement of the program.

## How to integrate *Write* **Now** into your classroom:

- Have students collaborate in small groups or pairs to craft short scenes
- > Create a whole-class scriptwriting activity
- Use it as an extension opportunity for specific students who might be interested in creating work



### **Theatre etiquette**

For some students this may be their first experience with live theatre. For many, this can be very exciting and we want you and your students, as well as all the other patrons coming to the theatre, to have the best theatre experience possible. If it is likely that your students are unfamiliar with general theatre etiquette (or even if they are and might need reminding) we strongly suggest going over it with them in preparation for your excursion, and discussing why the following things are important.

### **Mobile phones**

Phones should be switched off while in the theatre. Generally, photography and video recording of performances is not allowed unless an announcement has been made prior to the show.

### Refreshments

Food or drink is allowed into performances, but should be consumed discreetly and all rubbish should be disposed of in the bins provided. Refreshments are available at our kiosk.

### **Bags and prams**

School bags are not permitted into our theatre/auditorium. Staff will arrange storage for these items on request.

### **Indoor voices**

Responding to and interacting with the performers on stage in an appropriate way is encouraged, but talking loudly during inappropriate moments or in ways that may disturb other patrons is strongly discouraged.
