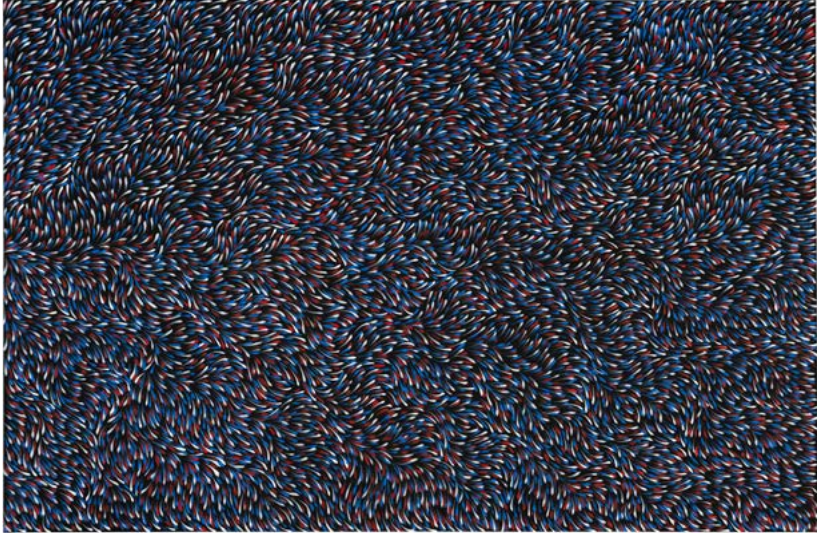

AFGHANISTAN

Andrew Quilty

Andrew Quilty is an award-winning photojournalist and author. His work in Afghanistan has been published worldwide and garnered accolades including a *World Press Photo Contest* award, three *Pictures of the Year International* awards and nine *Walkley Awards*, including the *Gold Walkley*. Curated by Ellie Waterhouse, *Afghanistan* is a profoundly moving and powerful exhibition of photographs captured during Quilty's years in the Afghan capital of Kabul from 2013 to 2022. Quilty describes his work from this period as an 'imperfect portrait of time and place'. His photographs skilfully balance moments of beauty and brutality, humanising the effects of war while inviting reflection on resilience, hope and the impact of conflict on everyday life.

Afghanistan is a Museums & Galleries Queensland (M&G QLD) touring exhibition presented in partnership with photojournalist and author Andrew Quilty, and curator Ellie Waterhouse. This project has been assisted by the Australian Government's Visions of Australia program and is supported by Human Rights Watch. M&G QLD is supported by the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland.

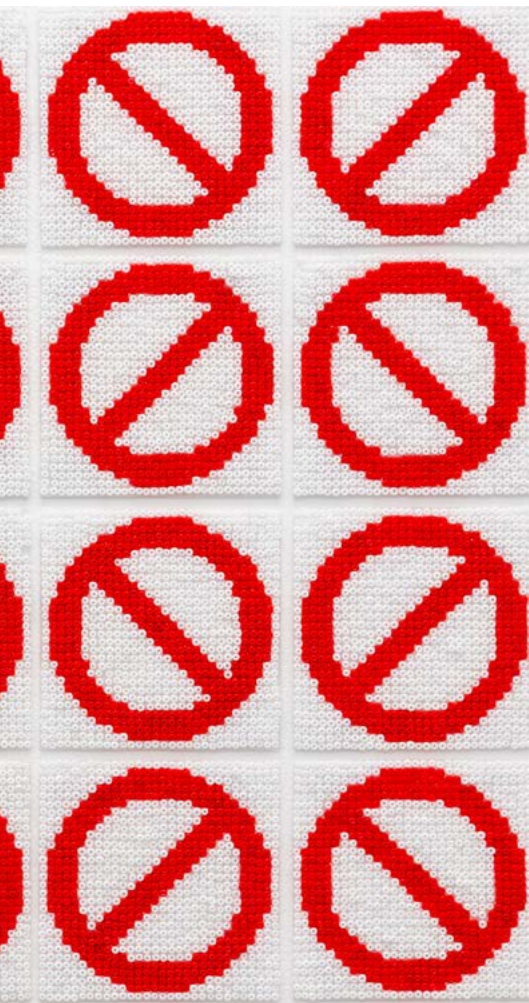

COUNTER GAZE

Curated by Sha Sarwari
Tamana Alizada
Razia Ghazal
Alia Qasimzada



Counter gaze is a powerful and timely exhibition curated by Sha Sarwari, featuring emerging Afghan-Australian artists Tamana Alizada, Razia Ghazal and Alia Qasimzada. Presented at Logan Art Gallery in 2026, this collective response to Andrew Quilty's acclaimed photographic series *Afghanistan* offers a deeply personal counter-narrative, shaped by lived experience, memory and cultural resilience.

While Quilty's work documents the external realities of life in Afghanistan – conflict, survival, and endurance – *Counter gaze* explores the internal landscapes of displacement, identity and belonging. The artists' practices span painting, installation and mixed media, incorporating symbolic motifs, Farsi script and fragmented imagery to evoke the emotional and psychological impact of forced migration and diasporic life. Curator Sha Sarwari, a Hazara artist, brings a nuanced understanding of the sociopolitical context, guiding the exhibition towards themes of healing, resistance and reclamation.

The project invites audiences to reflect not only on Afghanistan's past and present, but also on the ways in which its stories continue to evolve through the voices of its diaspora.

THE LINGERING FORGOTTEN THINGS

Wavey Ocean Forest

In this exhibition, Bethania artist Wavey Ocean Forest explores how death is part of life. Using animal skulls decorated with wire and gemstones, Wavey shows how beauty can be found in endings. The artworks help us think about change, memory and nature. This exhibition invites us to look closely and reflect on how life and death are connected.

DISSOLVE

Jill Sampson

Dissolve is a multi-media exhibition by Jill Sampson that explores living with cancer and caring for the land. The exhibition invites viewers to think about resilience, healing and the connection between people and the environment.

INNER DREAMING: SPIRIT AND HEALING

Sally Terare

Inner dreaming: spirit and healing shares Springwood artist Sally Terare's personal journey through art. Her paintings explore identity, healing and connection to Country. The exhibition invites viewers to reflect on their own stories and emotions, offering a quiet space to think, feel and connect.

THREE ECHOES – WESTERN DESERT ART

Three Echoes - Western Desert art is a stunning exhibition exploring the poetic notion of echoes - how metaphorically and metaphonically we can echo a thought, a sentiment or a consciousness. In the 1970s, Australian Aboriginal people from the desert began talking to the world through art, transferring their creation stories of the land and people to canvas. Now in the 2020s, this foundational echo is going back and forth. No longer a one-sided, outward calling, it reverberates multi-dimensionally within wider Australian and global communities.

Curated by celebrated curator, writer, artist and activist, Djon Mundine OAM FAHA *Three Echoes - Western Desert art* showcases 81 paintings, prints and batiks by 57 acclaimed artists heralding from Ikuntji (Haasts Bluff), Papunya and Utopia Aboriginal communities in the Western Desert regions of the Northern Territory, Australia.

Three Echoes - Western Desert art is an initiative of Museums & Galleries Queensland developed in partnership with Karin Schack and Andrew Arnott, and curated by Djon Mundine OAM FAHA. This project has been assisted by the Australian Government through its Visions of Australia program and through the Australia Council, its arts funding and advisory body. It is supported by the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland.

SHARING LOGAN'S STORIES

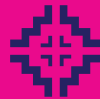
The Living Museum of Logan is a place to experience stories about the City of Logan and the people who call it home. It provides displays, murals, discussions and events that both celebrate and educate visitors about the city's past, present and future.

Hmong Journeys: Threads of Home invites you to explore the vibrant heritage and enduring resilience of the Hmong community through personal stories, traditional textiles, musical instruments and cherished belongings. This exhibition honours the lived experiences of Hmong residents in the City of Logan, tracing their journeys from homelands in Southeast Asia to new beginnings in Australia.

As the Hmong community commemorate 50 years of their settlement in Australia following the Vietnam War, this exhibition is both a celebration and a reflection. These stories reveal how Hmong identity is woven into the fabric of Logan's multicultural community, highlighting narratives of migration, memory and belonging. This exhibition is an invitation to walk alongside these journeys and to connect with themes of home, heritage and hope.

Across generations, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices have carried the strength, knowledge and truths of their communities, nurturing a connection to Country and identity. In this space, we honour these voices, highlighting the importance of kinship and knowledge held within communities. This provides an opportunity to listen, learn and reflect on the impact First Nations voices have had throughout history and guide future generations.

This space is co-curated with Logan's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Following consultation with Traditional Custodians, Community Elders, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander groups, organisations and artists, a working party was developed from Logan City Council's First Nations Action Group to guide the development of the First Nations space. The working group's shared wisdom and experience continues to inform the design, display content and resources you will find in this space.
